## **BOOK PROJECT**

*Identity and its Appeals in the Age of Immigration* (in progress)

This book uses national survey data, content analysis, and experiments to advance understanding on multiple fronts, including how Latino and Asian American populations come to identify with their ethnic and pan-ethnic groups, how identity variations relate to political variations within and between groups, how political candidates and organizations use group identity appeals to elicit support, and the consequences of ethnic and pan-ethnic appeals for the voting behavior of these minority groups. Studying both Latino and Asian American populations is important because each broader group contains people with varying experiences navigating their ethnic and pan-ethnic identities vis a vis the American racial categories imposed upon them. The book advances our understanding of how identity complexities, particularly of immigrants, shape group politics, representation, and political belonging of two important American electorates.
